

Answer three questions.

- 1 'It is no longer accurate to say that equity varies according to the length of the Chancellor's foot.'
 - With reference to decided cases, consider critically the role of equity in modern law. [25]
- 2 Queenie pays £700 to her neighbour for a second-hand freezer. After a week, it stops working and £400-worth of frozen food is ruined.
 - Explain to Queenie the steps she might take to recover her loss. What are the advantages and disadvantages of the procedures available to her? [25]
- The defendant's liberty is in your hands, but in your hands also are the interests of society.'
 Asquith J in R v Commons (1942)
 - Examining the selection and duties of the jury in criminal trials, discuss critically the accuracy of the above statement. [25]
- 4 Discuss the main bodies and methods which exist for reforming the law. Is there a need for a more unified system and what form might this take? [25]
- Discuss critically the function and jurisdiction of both the Civil Division and the Criminal Division of the Court of Appeal.
- 6 In 2009, more than 90 000 people sought to resolve employment disputes by going to the Employment Tribunal.
 - Consider critically how this process works and discuss the advantages and disadvantages of tribunals. [25]
