1 Show that
$$\sum_{r=n+1}^{2n} r^2 = \frac{1}{6}n(2n+1)(7n+1).$$

2 Find the set of values of *a* for which the system of equations

$$ax + y + 2z = 0,3x - 2y = 4,3x - 4y - 6az = 14,$$

has a unique solution.

3 Let $S_N = \frac{1}{2!} + \frac{2}{3!} + \frac{3}{4!} + \dots + \frac{N}{(N+1)!}$. Prove by mathematical induction that, for all positive integers N,

$$S_N = 1 - \frac{1}{(N+1)!}.$$

4 The points *A*, *B* and *C* have position vectors $\mathbf{i} + 2\mathbf{j} + 2\mathbf{k}$, $2\mathbf{i} + 4\mathbf{j} + 5\mathbf{k}$ and $2\mathbf{i} + 3\mathbf{j} + 4\mathbf{k}$ respectively. Find $\overrightarrow{AB} \times \overrightarrow{AC}$. [3]

Deduce, in either order, the exact value of

- (i) the area of the triangle ABC,
- (ii) the perpendicular distance from C to AB.

5 The curve *C* has polar equation $r = 1 + 2\cos\theta$. Sketch the curve for $-\frac{2}{3}\pi \le \theta < \frac{2}{3}\pi$. [2]

Find the area bounded by *C* and the half-lines $\theta = -\frac{1}{3}\pi$, $\theta = \frac{1}{3}\pi$. [4]

6 The curve C has parametric equations

$$x = t^2$$
, $y = \frac{1}{4}t^4 - \ln t$,

for $1 \le t \le 2$. Find the area of the surface generated when *C* is rotated through 2π radians about the *y*-axis. [7]

7 A cubic equation has roots α , β and γ such that

$$\alpha + \beta + \gamma = 4,$$

$$\alpha^{2} + \beta^{2} + \gamma^{2} = 14,$$

$$\alpha^{3} + \beta^{3} + \gamma^{3} = 34.$$

Find the value of $\alpha\beta + \beta\gamma + \gamma\alpha$.

Show that the cubic equation is

$$x^3 - 4x^2 + x + 6 = 0,$$

and solve this equation.

8 Let $z = \cos \theta + i \sin \theta$. Show that

$$1 + z = 2\cos\frac{1}{2}\theta(\cos\frac{1}{2}\theta + i\sin\frac{1}{2}\theta).$$

By considering $(1 + z)^n$, where n is a positive integer, deduce the sum of the series

$$\binom{n}{1}\sin\theta + \binom{n}{2}\sin2\theta + \ldots + \binom{n}{n}\sin n\theta.$$

9 The curve *C* has equation $y = \frac{x^2 - 3x + 3}{x - 2}$. Find the equations of the asymptotes of *C*. [3] Show that there are no points on *C* for which -1 < y < 3. [4] Find the coordinates of the turning points of *C*. [3] Sketch *C*. [2]

10 The curve *C* has equation $x^3 + y^3 = 3xy$, for x > 0 and y > 0. Find a relationship between *x* and *y* when $\frac{dy}{dx} = 0$. [4]

Find the exact coordinates of the turning point of *C*, and determine the nature of this turning point.

11 Show that
$$\int x(1-x^2)^{\frac{1}{2}} dx = -\frac{1}{3}(1-x^2)^{\frac{3}{2}} + c$$
, where *c* is a constant. [1]

Given that $I_n = \int_0^1 x^n (1 - x^2)^{\frac{1}{2}} dx$, prove that, for $n \ge 2$, $(n+2)I_n = (n-1)I_{n-2}$. [5]

Use the substitution $x = \sin u$ to show that

$$\int_0^1 (1 - x^2)^{\frac{1}{2}} dx = \frac{1}{4}\pi.$$

12 Answer only one of the following two alternatives.

EITHER

The vector **e** is an eigenvector of each of the $n \times n$ matrices **A** and **B**, with corresponding eigenvalues λ and μ respectively. Prove that **e** is an eigenvector of the matrix **AB** with eigenvalue $\lambda \mu$. [2]

It is given that the matrix A, where

$$\mathbf{A} = \begin{pmatrix} 3 & 2 & 2 \\ -2 & -2 & -2 \\ 1 & 2 & 2 \end{pmatrix},$$

has eigenvectors $\begin{pmatrix} 0 \\ 1 \\ -1 \end{pmatrix}$ and $\begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 0 \\ -1 \end{pmatrix}$. Find the corresponding eigenvalues. [2]

Given that 2 is also an eigenvalue of **A**, find a corresponding eigenvector.

The matrix **B**, where

$$\mathbf{B} = \begin{pmatrix} -1 & 2 & 2\\ 2 & 2 & 2\\ -3 & -6 & -6 \end{pmatrix},$$

has the same eigenvectors as **A**. Given that AB = C, find a non-singular matrix **P** and a diagonal matrix **D** such that

$$\mathbf{P}^{-1}\mathbf{C}^2\mathbf{P}=\mathbf{D}.$$

Obtain the general solution of the differential equation

$$\frac{d^2x}{dt^2} + 6\frac{dx}{dt} + 13x = 75\cos 2t.$$

Given that x = 5 and $\frac{dx}{dt} = 0$ when t = 0, find x in terms of t. [4]

Show that, for large positive values of t and for any initial conditions,

$$x\approx 5\cos(2t-\phi),$$

where the constant ϕ is such that $\tan \phi = \frac{4}{3}$.

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
